**Three year plan**: Staff will be working on a strategic plan for the school over the coming weeks/months. The main targeted areas will be attendance, literacy and numeracy as well as a coordinated approach to wellbeing. We hope to produce a strategic plan overall in the New Year.

#### PARKING PROBLEM

Please note that the row of parking spaces along the St Michael's school wall are all designated disability parking spaces. These are used by the buses collecting and dropping off our students with additional needs in the mornings and afternoons. As the number of buses outnumber the parking spaces it makes it very difficult if parents use these for drop off and pick up.

I note that some cars are still blocking nearby house entrances. Please avoid this if possible as parking so close to the school and these entrances is increasing risk to road users and children walking to school as well as being inconvenient for our neighbours.

# **DLD AWARENESS DAY**

# On Thursday, 17th October, 2024, as a school we will be celebrating DLD (Developmental Language Disorder) Awareness Day.

Leaflets about Developmental Language Disorder (D.L.D) and useful tips/ activities how to encourage children's speech and language development, and other information will be posted in front of the office.

#### What is Developmental Language Disorder (DLD)?

DLD stands for Developmental Language Disorder. A person with DLD has significant on-going difficulties understanding and/or using spoken language. DLD emerges in early childhood and can persist into adulthood. There is no obvious reason for these language difficulties, for example, the child does not have autism, a hearing loss, physical, emotional or learning difficulty.

In the past, DLD was known as Specific Language Impairment (SLI), but recently the name has changed so that it better reflects the types of difficulties children have. A Speech & Language Therapist, after assessing a child, seeing them for speech & language intervention and monitoring the child's response to therapy, will give a child a diagnosis of DLD if their language difficulties:

- have a significant impact on progress at school/ on everyday life
- are not as a result of autism, hearing loss, physical, emotional, or learning difficulty
- are likely to persist past the age of five years
- are unlikely to catch up without help

#### Do we know the cause of DLD?

There is no obvious reason for DLD, for example, there is no hearing loss, physical or learning difficulty or autism that explains the communication difficulties. Scientists think that the part of the brain responsible for speech & language might be wired a little differently from that of a person with more typical language development- but differences are subtle and won't show up on a brain scan. Genes do play an important part in DLD but there is no medical test to see if a child has it or not. We do know DLD runs in families.

#### How common is DLD?

DLD is a hidden but common condition. DLD affects people around the world, no matter thelanguage spoken. Studies in the U.K have shown that in five year olds, DLD affects about 2 children in every classroom in primary school (about 7.6%) and it is more common in boys than girls.

# **DLD AWARENESS DAY**

#### What sorts of problems would a child with DLD have?

For a child to be given a diagnosis of DLD he/she must have language difficulties that persist into school age and beyond. DLD does not affect children in the same way and the features of DLD vary with age, they may have some of these:

- Difficulty understanding what others say to them e.g. when asked questions/ given instructions
- Find it hard to join in and follow what is going on in the playground
- Difficulty remembering and sequencing their thoughts into words, even though they have the ideas and know what to say
- Difficulty remembering the words they want to say (word finding difficulties)
- Talk in sentences but have others find it difficult to understand their speech

A child with DLD won't necessarily sound like a younger child; instead their speech might sound disorganised or unusual.

#### Why is it important to recognise DLD?

In school, so much learning depends on being able to understand and use language. Children with DLD won't just "pick up" language, they will need support from a speech & language therapist, along with support teaching within the schools. Despite their difficulties with language, children with DLD can achieve well at school, both academically and socially. They just learn differently, the speech & amp; language therapist advises the child's parents and teaching staff to know their child's best learning styles, their strengths and how to develop skills and strategies/ activities which will help develop their child's speech and language, helping them achieve their potential. It is important DLD is identified so the children can receive the supports they need.

#### What should I do if I feel my child may need help to develop his/her speech and language skills?

If you are worried/ concerned about your child's speech and language development, you do not need to go through your doctor or public health nurse, as a parent, you can refer your child for a speech & language assessment. You can contact your local HSE Primary Care Centre for a referral form. Your child's class teacher may also, after discussing with you, recommend that you/school refer your child to the Meath HSE Speech & Language Therapy Service. As parents, if you agree, you both need to consent to this referral by signing the referral form.

# **SCHOOL ATTENDANCE**

#### Attendance information for parents

Attendance is recorded daily by the class teacher on our online roll books via a school information programme.

There are two reporting mechanisms for attendance where attendance is reported to TUSLA, the child and family agency.

There are two reporting periods in the year, September to December and January to June. We are required to submit the school attendance returns now for September to December and again in June.

On this form we are required to list pupils, who have missed 20 school days for any reason. You will be informed if your child is included in the report. Explained absences, due to illness etc, are not a cause for concern and shouldn't cause any worry at all but a large number of unexplained absences may lead to further involvement from the Education Welfare Officer in TUSLA..

While attendance is hugely important and good attendance correlates strongly with improved outcomes, there are also very valid reasons that children miss school and this is understood.

#### **Discretionary Referrals**

Discretionary referrals are made where a school has concerns about the attendance of a pupil. This might be due to a lot of unexplained absences, a pattern of absence, significant ongoing issues with punctuality leading to a lot of missed learning time etc. A school will refer a child to the Education Welfare Officer where they have these concerns. The role of the Education Welfare Officer is primarily to offer support to families to improve attendance. The school will always contact parents before referring to the Education Welfare Officer and support where possible.

#### Key things to note

- The aim of attendance and punctuality procedures are to ensure the child gets the best experience of education and maximises learning time. We are available to support as needed
- There is no need for concern if you get a letter saying your child has been included on the attendance report. Explained absences are recorded as such.
- Be sure to inform the school as to reason for absence so that this can be recorded. You can also do this on the Aladdin system.
